\**GOLTZ [1834-1902], occupied positions in the Universities of Königsberg and Halle before taking the chair in physiology in Strassburg in 1872. His early work on decerebrate and spinally ablated frogs initiated the modern study of reflexology, and together with other pioneer work by Sechenov in Russia, continued the neurophysiology of Johannes Müller and Marshall Hall. Many of his early demonstrations of the effect of neuro-damage in frogs began with the Beetoneseque statement - 'Take two frogs...', and he was able to show that decerebrate frogs would remain motionless when left alone but would respond by moving and croaking when stimulated. His work with mammals began in 1874, on dogs, though he always intended to extend his research into the human condition. Eventually and after a series of increasingly extensive cerebral ablations in dogs, he concluded that 'I will prove beyond the shadow of a doubt that Ferrier's theory [of localizatioon of function] is completely false'. His dispute with Ferrier came to a head [literally] at the Seventh International Congress of Medicine in 1881, the year of publication of the above text. Goltz's demonstrations were convincing but although accepting the results, Ferrier denied Goltz's conclusions. He thought Goltz's dissections were too crude and showed two of his own experiments, upon monkeys. Both series were examined by committee, which included Yeo and Gowers, concluding that Goltz had left intact certain ares of motor and sensory function and that Ferrier had sufficiently demonstrated that brain localization was indeed an existant fact. He was roundly attacked by the medical professionals and denounced from the pulpit of the *Lancet*; his agents, known as 'hygeists' were condemned and in 1836, one was convicted of manslaughter after a patient was found on post-mortem to have taken huge quantities of the purgative for rheumatism in the knee, alleged to have caused his death. Amongst the lay public, however, his popularity was such that many references to improved health were accompanied by the name of Morison and the *Universal Vegetable Pill*. Matthew Arnold, in his essay 'The Function of Criticism at the Present Time, wrote - 'Everyone knows the British College of Health; it is that building with the lion and the statue of the Goddess Hygeia before it; at least I am sure about the lion, although I am not absolutely certain about the Goddess Hygeia. This building does credit, perhaps, to the resources of Dr. Morison and his disciples, but it falls a great deal short of one's idea of what a British College of Health ought to be'.

The Reports list all the benefactors and subscribers, in order of generosity, give the names of the medical roll, provide accounts of the AGMs and the

secretary's Reports, list expenditure and income, the Resident Medical Officer's Report, and detail the motions of thanks to all who helped during the year. In all, the Reports are a detailed and vital historical source for the development of the local, voluntary hospital system in England. However, they are even more useful when dovetailed with other sources. For example, the Secretary's Report for the first year here, 1846, states - 'We regret to find that the affairs of the Institution are not in so satisfactory a state as the Report at the last General Meeting induce the Subscribers to infer. In the absence of a sufficient supervision by the late Auditor, considerable laxity appears to have occurred both in the collection of the income of the Institution and the payment of its expenditure; the result of which is, that large arrears of subscriptions have been suffered to accumulate, and a serious amount in tradesmen's bills, with which the accounts had been debited, remain unpaid.' This veiled statement is given clarity by the account in the same year in the North Devon Journal, that the Secretary and House Surgeon of the North Devon Infirmary, J. Knox, committed suicide with cyanide on the day his accounts were to be examined.

In 1846, the Consulting Physician was Dr. Britton, the Physician was Dr. Richard Budd, the Surgeons were Mr. Curry and Mr. T. S. Law, the House Surgeon and Apothecary was Mr. Morgan, and the Surgeon-Dentist was Mr. Borlase. In 1856, the post of Consulting Physician appears to have been eliminated and Richard Budd F.R.C.P. [1809-1896] was made the senior physician, retaining this post until his death. Interestingly, he became the most generous of all patrons in 1883, donating an annual £400 until he died in 1896. His successors were Drs. C. H. Gamble and J. Harper.

Each Report also gives a brief inventory of patient turn-over; overall, by the year 1900, the number of in-patients since the foundation in 1828, was recorded as 34,309 - the number of out-patients, 105,208.

DAVY [1778-1829], was a formidable autodidact, he read his first book on chemistry in 1796 and was lecturing in the subject at the Royal Institution in 1801. See DSB - 'In an early essay (1799), Davy attacked Lavoisier's caloric theory for introducing imaginary substances and the theory-laden term 'caloric'.... Of all those who worked on Volta's pile, Davy was consistently the clearest-headed. From the first he held to the chemical reaction theory of electricity production, and ultimately proved that the current in the electrolytic cells separated compounds into components and did not synthesize new substances. He invented the carbon arc [figure 18, plate 3, above]....[He] disproved Lavoisier's theory that oxygen was the principle of acidity. In the course of experiments he isolated and described many of the properties of potassium and sodium (1807). He then analyzed the alkaline earths, isolating magnesium, calcium, strontium and barium, and obtained boron and silicon. He established that chemical elements do not behave as 'principles' of acidity or alkalinity and concluded that chemical properties were a function of the relative arrangements as well as of the componenets of a substance. Davy showed that oxygen was never produced in reactions with oxymuriatic acid unless water was present, placed

*oxymuriatic acid among the elements, and named it 'chlorine'. He elucidated the nature and essential properties of iodine.'*

This edition contains, in addition, a Catalogue of Young's writings, mostly taken from his ms. copy found after his death, a valuable biographical memoir, the 'Astronomical Chronology of Egypt, deduced from Ptolemy, and his Commentators', and the Enchorial [demotic] dictionary, lithographed in facsimile, and based upon Champollion's work at the Louvre. Champollion had given Young access to demotic manuscripts in 1826, when he was curator at the Louvre, though he had earlier angered Young by trying to claim absolute credit for translating the Rosetta Stone hieroglyphs. Young was one of the first investigators of these hieroglyphs, with Silvestre de Sacy and Johan David Åkerblad. Åkerblad had constructed a demotic alphabet of 29 letters and wrongly considered demotic to be entirely phonetic or alphabetic. By 1814 he had successfully translated the enchorial text of the Rosetta Stone but failed with the hieroglyphic text, not understanding that the demotic and hieroglyphic texts were paraphrases rather than translations. Young had identified some foreign names in the cartouches of the hieroglyphic text but was not able to do more. He published his results in the 1819 edition of Encyclopaedia Britannica, the work that probably allowed Champollion to complete the decryption a few years later.*
