The second edition of 1650, however, besides having been better printed and produced, is considerably scarcer than its predecessor.... This edition was considered by Wilkin to be 'the handsomest, as to typography,' that had up till then (1835) appeared. Of the marginal annotations some*

are by Sir T.B., but others, as appears from the Advertisement on B1b, are by an admirer of the work, who was also responsible for the Alphabeticall Table... This edition contains considerable additions which are noted by Wilkin. Many technical words and quotations in the original languages are dropped, rhetorical questions are altered to positive statements, and there are numerous small improvements throughout.'

\*The first edition of this title was issued in 1799; this is the last edition to have been published. Clarke died in 1811 or 1812; he was a pupil of Cline senr., bought a commission in the 1st Foot and went to the West Indies, marrying his colonel's daughter. Bettany, in DNB, writes a tantalisingly brief and precise memoir - '... [he] relapsed into intemperate habits and took to writing as a refuge from starvation.... he was appointed a physician to the army by the influence of Cline and Astley Cooper, but did not mend his habits, and finally died of a diseased liver.... In it [New London Practice of Physic] he manifests very little knowledge of disease; he still advocates inoculation as the best remedy for small-pox, and mentions vaccination slightly.' It is a wonder that he merited a mention at all.....

*Orderly Volunteer [in the South African Wars]* - 'In Memoriam Sir James Paget' with the ms. comment that though approved of by Stephen Paget, it was nonetheless rejected by the Journal - 'A Lay of the British Nurses Association', with the ms. comment that he was Sir Dyce Duckworth's Hospital Physician at the time of writing and that Duckworth was the hero of this parody. In the original, printed in the SBHJ, Duckworth appeared as 'Duckworthius', altered in this collection to 'Polonius'. Garratt is recorded by COPAC as co-author of a paper in the BMJ, 1899, on scarlet fever.

In 1901 he had started a series of approaches to understanding the mechanism of the diaphragm, leading to an interest in 'Glénard's Disease', published in 1902 in the *London Hospital Gazette*, and later as the *Hunterian Lectures of 1903*, published in the *Lancet*. In that year also, he had presented a paper to the *Anatomical Society* under the title - 'A Contribution to the Mechanism of Human Respiration'. See chapters 13 and 14 of his *Autobiography*.

In 1922 phrenology was dead, but the funds remained. Although the 'bumps' of the head and brain could not be explained in the way phrenologists had believed, yet there must be some way of accounting for them. So the wise men in charge of the 'Henderson Trust' resolved to invite anatomists and others to lecture on the human skull and brain..... I had made a very elaborate study of the skull and brain of Sir Thomas Browne. I had compared them with the casts taken from the skulls of three other men - namely, Dean Swift, King Robert the Bruce, and Robert Burns. Such was the material I laid before my audience in Edinburgh.'*

In 1875-76 appeared their monumental work in this field, in which they affirmed through injections experiments and dissections the existence of the foramina of Magendie (discovered in 1825) and Luschka (1859), and presented the view that the cerebrospinal fluid escapes from the sub-arachnoid space through the Pacchionian bodies into the subdural space, then into the venous sinuses, and that some of it reached the cervical lymphatics.'*

He published this slight pamphlet in an attempt to overturn the unfair dismissal - 'You are aware that within the last few years a room, capable of holding 600 persons, has been built at the corner of the Hospital facing Smithfield, for the purpose of receiving medical and surgical patients, who are required to attend at 11 o'clock in the morning. Many of the Governors, however, may not be aware that this room is frequently crowded long before that hour, and that more than 1000 patients are often seen in the course of the morning..... House Physicians are obliged to see these cases, old and new, at the rate of 100 per hour, or less than 40 seconds a-piece...'. Presumably his case got nowhere, for in 1870, at the outbreak of the Franco-Prussian War, Mayo entered the medical

service of the German army as staff surgeon-major, supervising the building of the Alice Hospital in Darmstadt. After the war, he joined the Dutch medical service, went to Sumatra in 1873-4, then to Fiji where he contracted dysentery and died on the voyage to Sydney [see DNB].

Curiously, Mayo does not receive a mention in MEDVEI & THORNTON *The Royal Hospital of Saint Bartholomew 1123-1973, even though the relevant chapter on the Eighteenth and Nineteenth Centuries was written by Alfred White Franklin, from whose library this pamphlet was obtained.*

It seems to be my fate to espouse causes and theories which fail to carry conviction.'

\***AGAR [1882-1951], zoologist, educated at Sedbergh School and King's College Cambridge, where Bateson was an inspiration to him in studying genetics. His first position was in the Zoology Department in Glasgow and his main interest there was in the embryology of the lungfishes *Lepidosiren* and *Protopterus*. His meticulous study in this area and subsequently his investigation of parthenogenetic crustacea, led to his conclusion that Mendelian laws could be explained in terms of chromosome segregation. In 1919 he was appointed to the chair of zoology at the University of Melbourne. His longstanding interest in genetics and particularly Lamarckian inheritance was reflected in his introducing the study of cytology and genetics and particularly the investigation of marsupial chromosomes into the university curriculum. A central feature of his own research was the reworking of William McDougall's experiments on the inheritance of learning in rats. He had long been opposed to the theory of inheritance of acquired characters and his repetition of McDougall's work over twenty years was one of the most important refutations of previously influential Lamarckian theory.**

DAVY [1778-1829], was a formidable autodidact, he read his first book on chemistry in 1796 and was lecturing in the subject at the Royal Institution in 1801. See DSB - 'In an early essay (1799), Davy attacked Lavoisier's caloric theory for introducing imaginary substances and the theory-laden term 'caloric'.... Of all those who worked on Volta's pile, Davy was consistently the clearest-headed. From the first he held to the chemical reaction theory of electricity production, and ultimately proved that the current in the electrolytic cells separated compounds into components and did not synthesize new substances. He invented the carbon arc [figure 18, plate 3, above]....[He] disproved Lavoisier's theory

that oxygen was the principle of acidity. In the course of experiments he isolated and described many of the properties of potassium and sodium (1807). He then analyzed the alkaline earths, isolating magnesium, calcium, strontium and barium, and obtained boron and silicon. He established that chemical elements do not behave as 'principles' of acidity or alkalinity and concluded that chemical properties were a function of the relative arrangements as well as of the components of a substance. Davy showed that oxygen was never produced in reactions with oxymuriatic acid unless water was present, placed oxymuriatic acid among the elements, and named it 'chlorine'. He elucidated the nature and essential properties of iodine.'

The above offprint appears to be extremely scarce, only two copies recorded from major UK libraries - the British Library and the National Library of Scotland. A second paper, 'Light from a Fissure', forms Part II (1856) of this series but is even scarcer, with a single location in Birmingham. There is a related work - The Rotation of Coloured Discs, 1859', British Library only, but it is not clear whether it forms part of the series. Apart from these papers on optics, Gorham also wrote on intussusception in infants, for the Guy's Hospital Reports [Wellcome Cat. III, p.137], on the Tubular Balance, 1855, and his most popular work, Tooth Extraction, 1869 et seq. His intention in the title here offered was to demonstrate that the eye naturally magnifies objects when they are illuminated by 'pencils of light, which are disposed in a particular manner, have a defined magnitude, occupy a certain position before the eye, and are of a small intensity....'. He also introduces his DIASCOPE, advertised at the front of the book and obtainable from Highley - 'an instrument which enables us to develop the microscopic power of the eye by retaining an object close in front of it at one end, while it is examined by the light admitted through small apertures at the other.' The Advertisements at the end of the book are of some bibliographical/historical value, detailing a number of photographic and scientific works and listing some of the apparatus that Highley also offered for sale, illustrating their Hospital Microscope, Micro-chemical Cabinet and Quekett's Dissecting Microscope.*

\*COPAC records copies at Oxford, Manchester, Liverpool, Glasgow and SOAS. The Egyptian Dictionary was first published in 1830, as an Appendix to Tattam's Coptic Grammar. This edition contains, in addition, a Catalogue of Young's writings, mostly taken from his ms. copy found after his death, a valuable biographical memoir, the 'Astronomical Chronology of Egypt, deduced from Ptolemy, and his Commentators', and the Enchorial [demotic] dictionary, lithographed in facsimile, and based upon Champollion's work at the Louvre. Champollion had given Young access to demotic manuscripts in 1826, when he was curator at the Louvre, though he had earlier angered Young by trying to claim absolute credit for translating the Rosetta Stone hieroglyphs. Young was one of the first investigators of these hieroglyphs, with Silvestre de Sacy and Johan David Åkerblad. Åkerblad had constructed a demotic alphabet of 29 letters and wrongly considered demotic to be entirely phonetic or alphabetic. By 1814 he had successfully translated the enchorial text of the Rosetta Stone but failed with the

*hieroglyphic text, not understanding that the demotic and hieroglyphic texts were paraphrases rather than translations. Young had identified some foreign names in the cartouches of the hieroglyphic text but was not able to do more. He published his results in the 1819 edition of Encyclopaedia Britannica, the work that probably allowed Champollion to complete the decryption a few years later.*
