*A very popular account of a Continental tour in 'search of health' - it ran to a fifth edition in 1835 and is even available in reprint form today. MATTHEWS (1789-1828), educated at Eton and King's College Cambridge, travelled on the Continent on account of his ill-health and on his return published his journal. In 1821 he was called to the Bar and later appointed Advocate-Fiscal in Ceylon, where he remained until his death there in 1828. Following publication of his Dairy, he was regarded as a brilliant humorist, an opinion borne out by his observations. His first landfall was Portugal, where, he says - 'By-the-bye, I have not yet mentioned the priests, and for aught I know, they are more numerous than the dogs. Doghood and Priesthood are certainly the most thriving trades in Lisbon.' Later, whilst on ship for Italy, he writes - '..... my situation was sufficiently deplorable, and my only choice was between salt-water in the cabin, or rain-water on deck - Passed the remainder of the night like a half-drowned rat. I begin to suspect, that all I shall gain by my voyage will be the conviction, that a man who travels so far from home, in pursuit of health, travels on a fool's errand.... the fatigue and discomfort of such a little cock-boat as this, is much the same thing, as if one were tossed in a blanket during one half of the day, and thrown into a pigsty for the remainder.' Once on land, however, he took himself to see all the grand sights and the lesser ones and wrote dyspeptically about everything - clearly the journeying was tolerable as he did not return to England for nearly three years - approaching the English coast, he observes - '... long may (England) continue to inspire such feelings as now rise within me, in approaching her shores, and make one exult in the reflection that I was born an Englishman.'

The figure of the invalid in English literature of the nineteenth century is not without interest. The above book, together with Harriet Martineau's *Life in the Sick-Room* and the anonymous *Confessions of a Hypochondriac*, form the subject of Maria Frawley's socio-medical commentary 'Invalidism and Identity in Nineteenth Century Britain', 2004.

generosity, give the names of the medical roll, provide accounts of the AGMs and the secretary's Reports, list expenditure and income, the Resident Medical Officer's Report, and detail the motions of thanks to all who helped during the year. In all, the Reports are a detailed and vital historical source for the development of the local, voluntary hospital system in England. However, they are even more useful when dovetailed with other sources. For example, the Secretary's Report for the first year here, 1846, states - 'We regret to find that the affairs of the Institution are not in so satisfactory a state as the Report at the last General Meeting induce the Subscribers to infer. In the absence of a sufficient supervision by the late Auditor, considerable laxity appears to have occurred both in the collection of the income of the Institution and the payment of its expenditure; the result of which is, that large arrears of subscriptions have been suffered to accumulate, and a serious amount in trademen's bills, with which the accounts had been debited, remain unpaid.' This veiled statement is given clarity by the account in the same year in the North Devon Journal, that the Secretary and House Surgeon of the North Devon Infirmary, J. Knox, committed suicide with cyanide on the day his accounts were to be examined.

In 1846, the Consulting Physician was Dr. Britton, the Physician was Dr. Richard Budd, the Surgeons were Mr. Curry and Mr. T. S. Law, the House Surgeon and Apothecary was Mr. Morgan, and the Surgeon-Dentist was Mr. Borlase. In 1856, the post of Consulting Physician appears to have been eliminated and Richard Budd F.R.C.P. [1809-1896] was made the senior physician, retaining this post until his death. Interestingly, he became the most generous of all patrons in 1883, donating an annual £400 until he died in 1896. His successors were Drs. C. H. Gamble and J. Harper.

Each Report also gives a brief inventory of patient turn-over; overall, by the year 1900, the number of in-patients since the foundation in 1828, was recorded as 34,309 - the number of out-patients, 105,208.

The photograph was first taken by the firm of Maull and Polyblank and issued in their series 'Literary and Scientific Men, 1855, although here it appears to be attributed to Buchner. The publisher Schweizerbart wrote to Darwin on June 7th. 1862 - 'I shall add your portrait to the 2nd. German edition, from a photograph that I had sent to me from London for this purpose, since I believe it will make a welcome gift to all those who admire the book.'

*The ship 'Beagle' is shown moored off James Island, on October 17th. 1835. The topographical view is taken from the coastal sketch ordered by 2nd.Lieut. Sullivan at the time. The details of the 'Beagle' were taken from Admiralty charts and records. The artist, JOHN CHANCELLOR (1925-1984), originally a merchant seaman, latterly chartered his own hydrographic survey vessel and on retirement became one of the foremost marine artists of the 20th. century. This painting of the 'Beagle' was one of his last productions - it took 500 hours of research and 750 hours at the easel, is meticulous in its detail and full of atmosphere and interest. The run of 850 copies was sold out within 12 months and has been keenly sought since then. It is used on the 'Beagle Project' and the CUP 'Darwin On-Line' web-sites and is also the foundation work for the building of a replica 'Beagle'. *FREEMAN #14 - this is the genuine second issue of the second edition, preceded in the same year by the parts issue. It is distinguished from the third issue of 1845 by the printer's note on the verso of the title and by the Advertisements on the verso of page 519. It would originally have been issued in a publisher's binding of either red morocco or red/scarlet cloth and in that form would also have had pp.16 of inserted advertisements. These have been discarded by the binder of this volume.

The book was put onto stereo plates and Darwin sold the copyright for £150 - apart from the postscript added to the issue of 1860, this is the text as Darwin left it. He made extensive revisions of the 1839 edition, reducing the text from about 224,000 words to 213,000 words. To his regret, the maps were omitted but the number of woodcuts was increased. Freeman described it as a '...miserable piece of printing in small type with mean margins...!' Nonetheless, as he also states earlier - 'His first published book is undoubtedly the most often read and stands second only to *On the origin of species* as the most often printed. It is an important travel book in its own right and its relation to the background of his evolutionary ideas has often been stressed.'

*Only one location of a similar item can be traced world-wide - the HAGLEY MUSEUM, WILMINGTON, DELAWARE, has a catalogue and price-list of magneto and common-battery telephones, c.1900, published in Buffalo.

The fine illustrations demonstrate with some clarity the speed of technological advance, since it was a mere twenty-six years both since Edison brought out the first patent for a telephone, in February 1876, and Ericsson founded their company, in April of that year. The Centennial anniversary was celebrated with the manufacture of a facsimile model of the 'Eiffel Tower' - 'Skeletal' magneto table telephone. Their 2nd. Catalogue was issued in 1889 and their 6th. in 1911, printed in at least Swedish and English versions. This catalogue illustrates their vast factories in Stockholm and St. Petersburg, the New York branch office having been opened early in 1902. The Ericsson London office was opened in 1898, and at the time of this catalogue, land had been purchased in Tottenham, London, for the construction of their English factory.

*GLAUBER (1603/4 -1670), born in Karlsstadt, Bavaria, died in Amsterdam, the son of a barber and apparently self-taught, read books on alchemy, experimented, and conversed with others to educate himself. He travelled and worked widely on the Continent and whilst in Vienna contracted a fever which he cured by self-administration of the water from a mineral spring containing sodium sulphate, since then named after him - Glauber's Salt. He settled in Amsterdam in 1648, establishing a considerable laboratory, the Hermetic Institute, and wrote most of his books there. PARTINGTON, II p.343, describes Glauber as '...an extremely verbose, untidy and often obscure author... most conveniently read in the collected editions.' The 'Furni Novi' [New Philosophical Furnaces] is his first and most famous work - 'This is certainly one of the most remarkable books on chemistry of the seventeenth century,' FERGUSON I, p329. 'It contains most of his important chemical discoveries,' Partington. Packe's translation of the Collected Works was advertised one year before publication in his edition of van Helmont; it was to be priced at 20 shillings, of which 10s was to be paid in advance. 191 subscribers are listed, including Robert Boyle, Thomas Browne, and William Penn. Subscribers for 6 copies were to be given one copy gratis, a marketing technique long anticipating the supermarkets. Packe had obtained the original copper plates for the engravings in Amsterdam. In his own 'Medela Chymica', 1708, he advertised the remaining copies of the Works, still in quires, and available at 'a reasonable price'. He was an advocate for direct environmental influence on the anatomy of organisms, disagreeing with Darwin on the matter. His 1880 publication 'Die natürlichen Existenzbedingungen der Thiere' was translated into English for the International Scientific Series, in 1881. He had sent Darwin the German proof sheets.
